




May today inspire you to be a part of the work that will lead to future celebrations. May you take small steps, consistently over time, that will add up to big things.





WHY WE CELEBRATE

The civil rights movement that spanned 1955 through 1968 was led by Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., challenging and compelling Congress to dismantle the laws of segregation, discrimination, and racism against African Americans. This pivotal period of history is why we gather in the Charleston tri-county area for the annual Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Celebration.

We encourage you to always remember those 13 years of Dr. King's leadership, which shaped public policy and changed the course of American history forever. Due to the sacrifices of those who endured physical abuse while sitting-in at lunch counters, boycotting buses and businesses, and marching down highways and byways across the South, today all Americans have been freed to accomplish their goals, living out the American dream.

Make it your personal challenge to never forget:

- The Montgomery Bus Boycott of 1956, which led to the desegregation of public transportation
- The March on Washington in August 1963, which led to the passage of the Civil Rights Act dismantling institutional racism
- Bloody Sunday on the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma,
 AL and the Selma-to-Montgomery March in 1965,
 which forged passage of the Voting Rights Act
- Passage of the Fair Housing Act of 1968
- Passage of the MLK federal holiday

Make it your personal commitment, each time you celebrate the holiday, to vote in every election, to encourage other citizens to register and vote, and to make voting a priority for people you know and love. Lest we forget, it took generations of men and women to link heritage to hope and action through sacrifice, vision, and personal commitment, leading to passage of the King federal holiday.

MAKING HISTORY

YWCA Greater Charleston, an affiliate of YWCA USA, was founded in 1907. We have been eliminating racism and empowering women across the Charleston region ever since.

YWCA.GC played an important role during the civil rights movement in Charleston with Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s wife, Coretta Scott King, participating with our members and board in the historic 1969 MUSC hospital strike. By happenstance, our executive director at that time was Mrs. Christine O. Jackson: Coretta Scott King's first cousin.

In 1972, Mrs. Jackson founded one of the first MLK tributes in America. She was sitting in an evening YWCA meeting in 1968 when she received word of Dr. King's assassination, shaking her badly. She had last seen him in 1967 when he came to Charleston to speak.

In its first year the tribute consisted of a ball, suggested to her by a YWCA volunteer, Mrs. Margaret Thomas; Mrs. Jackson added a worship service. The pastor of an Alabama church served as the keynote speaker at her invitation. In its second year, the keynote speaker was Dr. King's father, Martin Luther King, Sr. "I remember Mayor Joe Riley being at that celebration," she says.

The MLK Business & Professional Breakfast Summit became a fixture in 2000, after Mrs. Jackson walked into Mayor Riley's office unannounced. Atlee Prince and Spencer Pryor had come up with the idea, and with the mayor's support, the breakfast was born. Cecelia Roger was its first chair. Mayor Joe Riley is still honored at the event, where the Joseph P. Riley, Jr. Vision Award is presented each year.

YWCA Greater Charleston continues to make history as




ECUMENICAL KEYNOTE

RABBI STEPHANIE ALEXANDER

RABBI, KAHAL KADOSH BETH ELOHIM

According to The Times of Israel, Charleston is home to one of the oldest Jewish communities in the US, numbering 10,000 in a recent study. Founded in 1749, Kahal Kadosh Beth Elohim (KKBE) is one of the oldest congregations in America, and its sanctuary is the oldest in continuous use for Jewish worship in America. Rabbi Alexander serves as one of two rabbis for the synagogue. Under her leadership, she and KKBE were founding members of Charleston Area Justice Ministry (CAJM), a faith-based social justice organization of 30 diverse congregations. She has also served on CAJM's board and as its co-president, and in 2016 became the first female and first Jewish recipient of the John H. Gillson Award for Racial Healing from the South Carolina Christian Action Council. Rabbi Alexander holds master's degrees in Hebrew Literature and Religious Education from Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, and earned her bachelor's degree and ordination from Tulane University.

YOUTH SPEAKER

ZACORA AYTIRE' SCOTT MLK BREAKFAST SUMMIT YOUTH ESSAY

Zacora, a native of Shulerville, SC, was born at 26 weeks old. Even as a medically homebound student, this spirited junior has maintained a spot on the "A" honor roll at Timberland High School and intends to attend college to earn a degree in fine arts. She is also the owner of ZAS Co., LLC, an independent modeling company, and serves on the board of the Shawn Jenkins Children's Hospital and as a member of the Youth Health Advisory Council, South Carolina Area Health Education Consortium, Talent Search, Trio Upward Bound Math and Science Programs at Trident Technical College, and Youth Volunteer Corps of Charleston with the Mayor's Office for Children, Youth and Families. At Heart to Heart International Ministries of Moncks Corner, she serves as an associate of the church's senior ministry, soup kitchen, and media and youth departments. She has also served as co-assistant to the chair of the Dr. Tonia Aiken Taylor Memorial Highway Project. Her aspirations include a career as a fashion designer and founder of EASS Foundation, a nonprofit resource center for youth and teens.



YOUTH SPEAKER

CADENCE BROWN

MLK ECUMENICAL SERVICE YOUTH ESSAY

Cadence Brown, a theatre major at the College of Charleston, aspires to restore wonder in young people by teaching theatre to them—and to found her own future agricultural business. She has interned at Swiss Krono USA and been selected as a South Carolina Horatio Alger Association Scholar. She is also a recipient of CERRA's Teaching Fellow Scholarship, awarded by one of the oldest and most established teacher recruitment program in the nation. Her selection, from among thousands of US essay applicants, as a member of the Disney Dreamers Academy class of 2022, made the news. At this mentoring program for 100 young Black leaders, famous Black actors, producers, and singers counseled the high-performing scholars. Cadence was one of only two students from South Carolina chosen.

A self-proclaimed drama queen, Cadence spends much of her free time to volunteering for local youth organizations and mentoring business-curious students.



PARADE MARSHAL

DAVID WHITE, JR., EXECUTIVE DIRECTORREAL TALK, REAL ACTION, REAL RESULTS (R3)

The leader of R3, the 2020 organizational recipient of the Joseph P. Riley, Jr. Vision Award, David is most well known today as a culinary influencer. Promoting Black food along with diversity and inclusion in the food industry through his social media initiative The Dropping Pin, he has collaborated with major festivals and others, most recently partnering with Food Network Canada on a nationwide campaign. He also now leads media relations for The Black Food Truck Festival, in addition to his decade-long position with the Department of Social Services. Prior to this, he owned and operated Laundry Matters, a laundromat and community hub where he pioneered after-school programs, computer classes, and free laundry services for the homeless and others. A member of the Top 40 Under 40 inaugural class of South Carolina State University, where he earned his bachelor's degree and MBA, David also serves on the boards of Charleston Promise Neighborhood and Always Awkward Hospitality Group.



DRUM MAJOR AWARD

REV. CLEMENTA PINCKNEY (POSTHUMOUS)
MOTHER EMANUEL AME CHURCH

The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Drum Major Award is a special memorial award recognizing an individual who follows in the foosteps of Dr. King, serves as a champion of equal rights, seeks greatness in service and love, selflessly performs daily acts of service to make her or his community and our world a better place, and seeks social justice for all who are repressed, discriminated against, or underrepresented.

Rev. Pinckney, an advocate for civil rights, exhibited these characteristics and more. A leader in the Christian faith who served his state and country as a South Carolina senator and SC House representative, he was the youngest African American elected to the SC General Assembly and fought for justice after the killing of Walter Scott. President Barack Obama delivered Rev. Pinckney's eulogy after he was killed in a hate shooting while leading a Bible study at the church he pastored, Mother Emanuel AME Church.



VISION AWARD

HARRIET W. WILDER

JOSEPH P. RILEY, JR. VISION AWARD RECIPIENT

Harriet, a champion of Charleston's children, was a pioneer many times over in her 51 years in education. Over a period of 20 years, as she served as a teacher and curriculum consultant for Charleston County School District, she saw that many children were not socially or academically ready for first grade. She took action, founding the first Black privately owned and operated child care center in West Ashley. Nine years later, she opened a second location on James Island. Together, the two Hope's Treasure Chest locations have guided the development of 2,500 children over a span of 31 years. And yet Harriet wasn't finished. Deciding to better prepare children beyond preschool, she and a friend founded Charleston Progressive Academy, a Charleston County magnet school, in 1997. She also served as a senior steward and committee chair many times for Morris Brown AME Church. She holds a bachelor's degree in early education from St. Augustine's College and a Master of Education degree from South Carolina State University.



TRIUMPH AWARD

HERBERT L. DRAYTON, III
HARVEY GANTT TRIUMPH AWARD RECIPIENT

Herbert, a US Air Force and Marine Corps Reserves veteran, is the managing partner of venture capital firm HI Mark Capital, which invests in technology-enabled businesses owned by women and Black, Indigenous, and other people of color across the Southeast. A passionate advocate for community service and civic leadership, he chairs the boards of directors for Coastal Community Foundation and Palmetto Goodwill. He also serves on the boards of the Charleston Metro Chamber of Commerce, SCbio, Roper St. Francis Foundation, Bright Focus Foundation, and the Association of Black Foundation Executives. He is an Advisory Board member of the Securities and Exchange Commission's Access to Capital Committee, a former board chair for One80 Place, and a founding member of the Charleston Deal Alliance. During his 20 years of experience establishing, buying, and managing businesses, he has counseled countless entrepreneurs, averaging 10-20 mentorship calls per week.


Lift every voice and sing


